Cama'i Tribal Members,

I would like to start off by congratulating my fellow council members James Dunham and Malia Villegas who were re-elected this past September at NVA's Annual Meeting. I would also like to sincerely thank those of you who joined us for the virtual meeting. I appreciated the opportunity to connect with members near and far, familiar faces and new acquaintances. The COVID-19 pandemic has certainly changed our lives and a lot of things for the Native Village of Afognak, especially for the beloved Dig Afognak Camp. Although we held one very successful camp in July, the decision was made to shut down camp for the rest of the summer due to the influx of cases in the Kodiak Region. It turned out to be the right choice as local case counts increased significantly in the following weeks. Case counts have been diminishing and vaccinations are available to children so we are planning on hosting a full-fledged camp schedule this coming summer and are excited to resume the wonderful tradition of bringing our people together to learn and share our special history and culture. Please let us know if you have any questions about the upcoming camp season.

I would like to commend and thank the Afognak Native Corporation for conducting the Annual Afognak Native Corporation Golf Tournament fundraising event this summer. This year's tournament raised a record amount of money for the Native Village of Port Lions and the Native Village of Afognak, providing nearly \$49,000 for each Tribe, which will help NVA greatly with providing Dig Afognak Cultural Camp! Our Tribal Administrator and her Executive Assistant both attended and assisted ANC staff. They were very impressed with the logistics and the flow of the tournament, and found it fun and exciting to be a part of such a great event.

Last December NVA utilized CARES Act funding to offer a \$300 cash distribution to tribal members. We are now planning on distributing a variety of seafood to tribal members who have a current physical address and phone number on file. Please contact the office to make sure we have current contact information so that we can send you this wonderful package soon!

Staff is currently developing plans for providing cultural activity packets for kids and adults in the new year. Information will be available on the Native Village of Afognak Facebook page or by contacting the office. Some furniture is made with woods that have been treated with formaldehyde.




Go Fragrance Free:




Nadia Mullan Alutiiq Heritage Library Features
